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Laurie Baker joins Bates as an Assistant Professor of Mathematics. She is a disease ecologist and marine biologist by training with a keen interest in data science, spatial statistics, and the use of novel data sources in decision making. Laurie earned her B.Sc. degree in marine biology at the University of St. Andrews. She completed graduate studies in marine biology at Dalhousie University (M.Sc.) and in epidemiology at the University of Glasgow (Ph.D.). The core of her research focuses on spatial and temporal patterns in human and biological systems including disease spread, animal movement, and fisheries management. During her free time, she enjoys cycling, hiking, swimming, sailing, and knitting.



Nick Balascio

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Nick Balascio joins Bates as an Associate Professor of Earth and Climate Sciences. Nick is a paleoclimatologist and his research examines how recent climate changes due to global warming compare to past centuries and millennia by interpreting clues in geologic archives. He primarily works in the Arctic and reconstructs past environmental conditions by analyzing geochemical properties of sedimentary records. Nick holds a Ph.D. from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, an M.S. from Northern Arizona University, and a B.S. from Union College. He was a Lamont Postdoctoral Fellow at Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory of Columbia University and most recently was a faculty member in the Geology Department at William & Mary prior to arriving at Bates.

Cat's studio work includes large-scale gestural abstract paintings and collaborative projects that address issues of art and healing. 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Frances Bell joins Bates as a Visiting Assistant Professor of History. Her current research examines the migration of several thousand enslaved and formerly enslaved people from revolutionary Haiti to the early United States between 1791 and 1810, focusing in particular on their interactions with the law as they moved between jurisdictions. Joyce Bennett

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Joyce Bennett joins Bates as an Associate Professor of Anthropology. Her research focuses on how marginalized Indigenous peoples, especially those in Guatemala, resist oppression as they navigate the global neoliberal market.
